37-Year-Old Anti-Cruelty Group Secures New Lease On Life After Four-Month 'Curc'

By MILTON DANZIGER Chicago, Dec. 10-In less than four months Dr Wesley Andrew Young. formerly veterinary supervisor of Boston's Animal Rescue league has re-Juvenated Chicago's 37-year-old Anti-

Cruelly society.
This Chicago Institution was ormanized in 1899 by Mrs




