Runner-up was a golden Agouti doe shown by J Hartley with top colour and ticking exceptionally good and well car-ried out under, good eye and type but not quite as immaculate as the cham-pagne, no doubt it was showing the effects of a lot of handling. The Broken, winner of the Marked section was E Kitchen's well-known buck. This is a wonderful mouse but i think it is just past its best. Colour of spots is not as dense as it used to be and it had not the condition of the leading pair.
