MR. PERCY ASHLEY concludes his account on the mouse Fancy past and present with the following observations:—

"There is a point regarding Tans which I and others would like cleared up. The standard reads, 'Colour of feet should be, inside tan and remainder of foot same colour as top colour.' The question, therefore, is which is the greater fault, solid coloured feet or all tan feet? No guide is given, but most judges, of course, favour solid feet. Perhaps the N.M.C. committee will give the matter consideration in the near future.

"A feature which has slipped back is eyes. I do not say that all mice have poor eyes, but, generally speaking, the 'bead eyes' we knew in days gone by are not there. How lovely are two really prominent eyes, and how they set off a mouse.

"Coats also need attention. The coat of a good many of our show mice of to-day is ragged and not short and sleek to the hand. It would appear that we are forgetting the minor points such as eyes, ears, muzzle and tail. Let us remember that it is the perfect mouse which breeders are striving for and this will not be achieved unless they remember everything that is necessary. ber everything that is necessary. A mouse which excels in one point only is not wanted. Give me the balanced animal every time.

"I am a great believer in specialisation and, in my opinion, a good many fanciers to-day start off with too many varieties. I think everyone will agree that it is better to have one variety at the top than several hanging on. With most of us, the time at our disposal is short, so use the time available to the best advantage. Let quality and not quantity be your motto all the time and every time."

I entirely agree with Mr. Ashley regarding the minor points. As he says, far too many mice are poor in coat and lacking type, ears, skull, muzzle and tall. At this stage, it might be as well to dwell on the standard which we are aiming for, as set out in our Year Book. Here it is:—

"The mouse must be long in body, with long clean head, not too fine or pointed at the nose, the eyes should be large, bold and prominent, the ears large and tulip shaped, free from creases, carried erect with plenty of width between them. The body should be long and slim, trifle arched over loin, and racy in appearance, the tail (which should be free from kinks) should come well out of the back, and be thick at the root or set-on, gradually tapering like a whip-lash to a fine end, the length being about equal to that of a mouse's body. The coat should be short, perfectly smooth, glossy and sleek to the hand."

On far too many occasions, we as judges ean only judge on colour, for the features

on far too many occasions, we as judges can only judge on colour, for the features which go to make a perfect mouse are lacking. Let us, therefore, from now on pay more attention to the minor points, for they do indeed finish off an animal. We do not want a thick-set, stodgy mouse with small ears, narrow skull and poor tail, but one which will stand in a perky manner and, if it could speak, say "aren't I a pretty picture?"

We are indebted to Mr. Ashley for his comprehensive treatise on the mouse Fancy, and I am sure that all will have found it interesting and will join with me in extending to him our grateful thanks.

# JUNIOR JOTTINGS SPRING GREEN-FOODS





Plants illustrated here are Hedge Parsley, Avens, Knotgrass, Crosswort, Trefoil and Coltsfoot, all of which can be safely fed to stock.

SPRING has arrived and with it fresh young shoots and weeds. Many readers have written to me to tell me that they are taking sacks and bags and are gathering the fresh food. O.K. juniors, but don't overdo it! Remember that your adult rabbits haven't eaten weeds since about last October, and your babies have never tasted greenfood. So feed cautiously at first, and vary the rabbit's diet.

Why not feed a little groundsel? Mix it with tender grass and chickweed as groundsel is reputed to keep rabbits in condition and to help them through their moult. I have never attempted to prove this theory, but I do know that it is an excellent food for rabbits.

Feed just a root or two the first day, and if there is any signs of scouring in the rabbitry don't feed any more weeds, but give

Feed just a root or two the first day, and if there is any signs of scouring in the rabbitry don't feed any more weeds, but give plenty of hay, water and a little hard stale bread. Please remember that greenfoods must be clean and unsoiled by dogs.

FEED. — Agrimony, bramble, burnet, butterbur, cow parslip, clover (red and white), coltsfoot, chickweed, goose-grass, crosswort, dandelion, dock (before seeding), groundsel, heather, hedge parsley, plantain, shepherd's purse. AVOID.—Arum, anemone, bindweed, bluebells, buttercups, bryony, corn suckle, celandine, deadly nightshade, docks (in seed), foxglove, ground ivy, hemlock, poppies, sorrel, toadfiax, tavellers Joy.—PAT KILBY.
