Mr. Metcalfe proposed an amendment that the committee should select a venue either in October or November. On being put to the meeting Miss Radeglia's proposition was carried.

Mr. Dinning proposed that Durham County should be better represented on the iudges' panel (at least three judges). Mr. Pipe stated that the feeling of the fanciers in Durham was that if they had more judges on the panel more fanciers would ioin the club. He said that he was the only club judge who resided in Durham County, and it was a great expense to societies to send into Yorkshire or elsewhere for club judges. There was a roar of disapproval when Mr. Pipe suggested standing down from the judging panel to let another Durham member take his place. Mr. Mitchell said that if the fanciers in Durham would only join the club now and use their vote at the proper time, they were sure to put on the panel whoever they wished. Methods of dividing the country into more sections to provide for Durham County were discussed, but nothing arose to satisfy the meeting. Mr. Mitchell's proposal that the method of electing judges should remain as at present was carried.

I THINK I had better finish one story before commencing another, Readers will, in any event, want to know how Mr. Asquith, of Heckmondwike, fared with his exhibition of Fancy mice. Here in his own words is a synopsis of what took place.:

"The weather on the day of our exhibition was terrible and this did not help us, but we had a good show and plenty of visitors. What few mice we had caused much interest, and our little table was surrounded for the best part of two and a-half hours. Along with Mr. Tom Blackburn, Birstall, we were kept busy answering all manner of questions. Mr. Blackburn went through the process of judging the mice and explained the faults and good points to a very interested and attentive audience. The prospectus forms which you sent were soon gone, and the books borrowed.

"The day after the exhibition, Sunday, I was kept busy with visitors and only wished I could have shown them more mice. We have several juveniles among our members, and they come to every show, but cannot afford to buy or keep rabbits and cavies. I have started up some of these juveniles with a pair of mice. I can only hope that it will encourage them to become fanciers "I had a trip round during the week and picked up about 22 mice. These were all disposed of on the Sunday.

"In the case of the adults who inquired about Fancy mice, I referred them to Furand Feathers, the year book and yourself, explaining that, if you had not the variety which they fancied, another fancier would be recommended. The rabbit and cavy men would have liked to have seen some Agoutis, Chinchillas, Sables, Foxes, Silvers, etc.

"My Society will hold a meeting on Thursday, when I will put your letter before them and see if they will give mice a trial."

Another letter from Mr. Asquith reads:—"I showed your letter to the committee."

Another letter from Mr. Asquith reads:—

"I showed your letter to the committee of my society at our recent meeting, and they were very pleased with the contents, so much so that they are considering classes for mice at our March 22nd show. If members of the N.M.C. would give some support, they would be quite willing to "have a go." My society asked me if I would contact you with regard to this support. I would also ask fanciers who would be willing to help with the section to write me. I should then be in a position to ask for classes in March "What do you think would be a suitable classification? For myself, I would suggest marked adult, marked under 8 weeks, Self adult, Self under 8 weeks, A.O.V. adult, and A.O.V. under 8 weeks. Anything you could do to help would be much appreciated."

In my reply, I told Mr. Asquith that six classes would not be sufficient under present-day circumstances to create a draw, and suggested a minimum of ten classes. But whatever the classification I am sure that members will rally to the call and assist Mr. Asquith in his object of booming the Longtalls in Heckmondwike, As I said before, the work being carried out by Mr. Asquith on our behalf is meritorious and praiseworthy. Compared with what he has done and is prepared to do, the sending of a few entries would be nothing at all. I cannot help but wonder how many mouse fanciers we have in the Heckmondwike district; not a lot according to our records, but whoever they are and wherever they may be. I would ask them to link up with Mr. Asquith and Mr. Blackburn, and see what can be done about getting together a really active and enthusiastic body. With such a grand leader, it should not be difficult. Who knows, we may have in Mr. Asquith's efforts the embryo of a new local mouse club. At one time, there were several mouse fanciers in and around Heckmondwike, I would ask members to keep a careful eye on the advertisement columns of Fur AND Feathers, and if they


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
