HOW A CHOCOLATE FOX MOUSE HAS BEEN PRODUCED

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A T the time of writing the weather is A back to normal, which is to say, more like Iceland than anything. Up to now my stock has come through very well but I am airaid some fanciers have had losses. A letter from Mrs. Blowers raises an unusual point in this connection, and I should be interested to know if other fanciers have had similar experiences. Mrs. Blowers says:

"I keep my mice in the old mill attached to the farm house and, in spite of stacks of lay surrounding the boxes, to my regret found every buck dead with the cold and surrounding after that no does were dead. The provide the contained one buck and two does, and in every case the buck was dead."


From what I have learned from other fanciers the main trouble they have had has not been the cold so much as dampness due to condensation this shows more clearly than anything the vital need for plenty of top venilation in the boxes.

Mr. Stephen, Truro, has been well known for some time for his outstanding outcrosses with Fox mice. It was, therefore, with very great pleasure that I received an article from nim. Here it is:

"I was a rabbit fancier until 1940 when, through lack of space I had to give up. Thinking I must have some sort of livestock, I bought a trio of black Fox—spela Fox they should have been called. Still they were just what I wanted—something that left plenty of room for improvement.

"By keeping the standard for Fox mice constantly in mind and always being extracritical of my own stock, every little fault stood out to me like a beacon and had to be corrected. If, by doing so, I have helped to improve the Fox mouse. I hope that in time to come I shall warrant being named the "Cornish Expert".

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FEEDING AND GENERAL MANAGEMENT

Mice should be fed at least once each day, and the usual practice is to feed just after tea, or, early evenings. The exact time is not important, but always stick to the same time each day. If you vary the time, the young litters will suffer, and, as a consequence, a loss in size may well result. It is a good idea to give does with a litter just a little extra, say, in the morning, er midway between feeding times. A doe, beginning to feel the pangs of hunger cannot be expected to feed and keep warm an ever hungry family.

Whole oats (if you can get any) are the staple food for mice. A teaspoonful of oats is about the daily ration. Careful observation at feeding time will enable you to decide whether to increase or decrease your food, for mice, like human beings, vary in appetite. In these days, many fanciers, through force of circumstance, are feeding dog biscuits, kitchen scraps, etc. The condition of mice at present-day shows are a credit to their patience and versatility. Place clean, dry hay, in the nest box and renew sawdust in the run at least once a week, twice, if you can manage it. Clipped paper and fine wood shavings are a good substitute for hay, there seems to be nothing as suitable as sawdust for the run.

I always leave much of the old hay in, if it is dry, for you will find that the mice usually make a cosy nest in the centre. You can lift out this centre "ball" and renew the hay round the outside. Do not pack the hay too tight, if you do you may cause sweating.

Remember, cleanliness and regular feeding are essential to success.

Last week I dealt with housing. The rack pictured at the head of this column is very useful for keeping breeding boxes neatly arranged.

The period of gestation for mice is 21

days. When mating, let your buck run with two does and remove him between the 14th and 18th day. You can let the does have their young in the same nest if you wish, or if you want to keep a record of each individual mouse, then separate them when you remove the buck Litters vary in size; up to twelve is not uncommon; a doe of mine once had fifteen, but even this has been exceeded. To maintain size, reduce your litters to about four, destroying two or three each day until you reach this figure. After a bit of experience you will have no difficulty in defining the sexes at a few days old, and bucks can be destroyed first, that is, if you are not requiring many bucks. Rearing three does and one buck in each litter is a good system.

If you wish to build up a strain very quickly mate a trio of waster mice up at the same time as your best stock. When the waster does kindle, destroy their young and replace them with the surplus youngsters from your best litters.

One very successful fancier does not allow his best does to rear any young. A day or two after kindling the youngsters are transferred to fester does. His best doe is within a fortnight.

The strain of carrying and giving birth is not as great as the strain of rearing a litter.
