

THE IDEAL ABYSSINIAN

And hoping in the near future to make a start with Abyssinians. I saw a rosetted cavy for the first time at the recent Bradford championship show, and I was quite taken up with their pecutiar formation of hair. One fancier present gave me a tew particulars as to what are the chief points to look for. Shortly afterwards I read in 'Fur and Feather' that Judges are to be asked to severely penalise flat backs in Abyssinians. Will you, therefore, please explain in your column what is really meant by a flat back, as it leaves me a bit in the dark on this point. Also can Abyssinian be kept in outdoor hutches?"

Both these questions have been raised before, but there may be new fanciers who would be interested fas I know several are getting "Abyssinian minded"), so here is the required information.

First the flat back. An Abyssinian with a flat back is one that is more or less smooth-coated on top. In other words, there is no upstanding ridge of hair running down the centre of the back from the shoulders to the side. When these two rosettes are placed too far forward, a flatness of coat appears between these and the hind-quarters. When this happens the body rosettes on each at the hutches are well off the ground, in a direct line. The correct formation and placing of the rosettes make those essential fridges.
